Our charities

Switchback, which provides crucial employment opportunities and experience for young men on leaving prison, continues to thrive. They have developed an Experts by Experience scheme, in which their trainees become involved in the charity to advise on campaigning and programme development.

This year, for the first time, a former Switchback Trainee, Kamaran, progressed to become a staff member of Switchback, winning a Girdlers' Company Award for 'Outstanding Team Member' (he is photographed here receiving the award).



Newark Youth continues to offer sporting opportunities, summer programmes and safe evening activities for young people around Stepney (Frank's old neighbourhood, where he had originally wanted to set up a cricket club!) and Poplar.

Our Trustee, Kerrin Isaacs, has been along to watch some of the Sunday football sessions at the Newark Youth



Football Academy for children aged 5 to 16 years where sessions are delivered by FA and UEFA qualified coaches. She has been impressed by the enthusiasm and professionalism as well as the opportunities given to young people to become leaders within the organisation. Our funding supports the cost of pitch hire, equipment and coaching.



SPLASH, run by the indefatigable Sister Christine Frost, has been running an extraordinary food programme in Poplar and Limehouse since the start of the pandemic. In October 2021, they delivered their **20,000th dinner since March 2020**.

Elizabeth Haines visited them at work in the St Matthias Community Centre earlier in the year. They are also doing terrific work introducing elderly people to IT, which has become so crucial for social contact during the pandemic. This is also an inspiring example of inter-faith activity to target deep poverty at a time of exceptional need.
